Background

Tropical storm "Nate" formed on Thursday the 5th of October off the Caribbean coast of Nicaragua. The storm caused heavy rains and landslides throughout several countries in Central America. According to the report of SINAPRED (National System for Disaster Prevention), 73 municipalities from 11 departments were affected by heavy rains and winds (Chontales, Madriz, Boaco, Rio San Juan, Nueva Segovia, Triangulo Minero, Carazo, Rivas, Granada and the North Caribbean.). There are varying degrees damage throughout the 124 neighborhoods and communities. 8236 houses were reported to have incurred some type of damage, of which 33 are totally destroyed; moreover, 6185 houses were flooded, and 27 remain at risk. 425 people were evacuated to solidarity homes. There are 14 isolated communities in Granada, Rivas, Carazo and Madriz. The Nicaraguan authorities have registered 16 fatalities as direct result of the storm. The government of Nicaragua has provided food supplies for more than 1600 affected households. The Ministry of Health has deployed 56 medical brigades composed of 544 health workers to the affected areas. Food security assessments are being carried out and protection measures are being taken for vulnerable people in affected villages.

Humanitarian Needs

Data collected by the National System for Disaster Prevention in the affected communities indicates, that tropical storm Nate has critically damaged main livelihoods and food stocks. The population affected by Tropical Storm Nate in Nicaragua are in dire need of food, shelter, health services, access to safe water and restoration of livelihood. For this response requesting member along with the local partner organizations has identified gaps in food security. More specifically, the pollution of households' available water sources, especially wells, remains a big issue, as they were exposed to high levels of contamination due to overflowing rivers and increased rainfall.



Capacity

The ACT Forum in Nicaragua has many years of experience in humanitarian response. More specifically, in 1998, the ACT Forum in Nicaragua effectively responded to communities affected by hurricane Mitch, and have responded to several emergencies since then; including other major events between 2007-2008 when the country was hit by hurricanes Bertha and Felix respectively. Emergency response for minor emergencies such as floods and an earthquake in the municipality of Leon was carried out in 2014. The ACT Forum in Nicaragua through its local members Interchurch Center For Theological and Social Studies (CIEETS), Council of Protestant Churches in Nicaragua (CEPAD) has also participated in the implementation of two (regional appeals in Central America, in response to households affected by droughts in 2014-2015. CEPAD is going to implement the RRF in close coordination with Interchurch Center for Theological and Social Studies (CIEETS), both organizations are ACT local members, and are going to be implementing partners in this response. The ACT Forum in Nicaragua has a strategic plan and an EPRR. The members of the ACT Forum have the capacity to respond in the affected area due to the understanding of the context and operational presence.

Monitoring and evaluation

Council of Protestant Churches in Nicaragua (CEPAD) will be responsible for the overall implementation of the project and will establish a Memorandum of Understanding (MoU) with CIEETS. CEPAD in coordination with CIEETS will establish coordination with other humanitarian actors at field level, as well as with local authorities. Regular meetings will be held, in order to share information concerning progress

in the implementation process. The monitoring and evaluation will include regular visits to follow up on the achievement of results, and preparation of a situation reports, as well as the final reports. CEPAD with the Nicaragua ACT Forum will lead meetings to make appropriate decisions for successful implementation. A final report will be submitted by CEPAD following the guidelines provided by ACT. The monitoring and evaluation will consist of field visits to the communities with the participation of the involved staff, in accordance with established procedures. A final report and final evaluation will be presented to ACT Alliance.

Section 3: ACT Alliance coordination

Coordination

CEPAD serves as the overall coordinator of the response and will coordinate the implementation of the response with CIEETS. Coordination has been established with the governments and local networks, in order to facilitate the implementation, the implementing organizations are going to work in close coordination with local authorities, local leaders in the concerned communities as well as with relevant stakeholders to avoid duplication of efforts. The implementation mechanisms are activated and managed by the members involved in this proposal: CEPAD and CIEETS.

Implementation arrangements

CEPAD is going to work in close coordination with CIEETS, as well as with the forum members. Coordination will be established with the local governments and local networks in order to facilitate the implementation. Accountability for the delivery of this response will follow open and transparent processes. CEPAD will sign a specific cooperation agreement with CIEETS. CEPAD will be responsible for the M&E activities, and report to ACT Alliance. The local leadership will be actively involved in the execution and monitoring activities related to this response.

Human resources and administration of funds

CEPAD have financial and administrative procedures which will be applied for the administration of funds. CEPAD will transfer funds to CIEETS for the implementation of the response in their respective areas of intervention. Food products will be purchased based on the quality of products and suitable prices defined by 3 quotes. It is important to mention that CEPAD and CIEETS have efficient accountability systems. There will be a coordinator of the project who will be responsible for the timely implementation of the stated activities. CEPAD is going to create a separated account for the RRF budget administration. Each implementing member will delegate a person to assure the timely implementation of the response.

Communications

The implementing organizations are going to carry the logo of ACT alliance during the distribution of aid. Photos and stories will be provided for communication purposes. Regular reporting will be share within the alliance, as well as life stories.


