### Rapid Response Fund (RRF)

Section 1: Overview of response

#### Background

The floods in Assam turned critical in the first week of July 2019. Incessant rains in the state led to overflow of major rivers and tributaries leading to inundation in the catchment areas of river Brahmaputra. The floods caused massive displacement of people and damaged the crops, livestock and properties. This also led to destruction of critical infrastructure and hampering essential services. The current flood scenario has affected 4.3 million populations in 4157 villages under 113 Revenue Circles. Out of the total 33 districts in Assam 30 districts have been badly affected. The total death has risen to 71 in the current flood. The flood hit districts are Dhemaji, Lakhimpur, Biswanath, Sonitpur, Darrang, Udalguri, Baksa, Barpeta, Nalbari, Chirang, Bongaigaon, Kokrajhar, Dhubri, South Salmara, Goalpara, Kamrup Metro, Morigaon, Hojai, Nagaon, Golaghat, Majuli, Jorhat, Sivasagar, Dibrugarh, Tinsukia, Cachar, Karbi Anglong, Hailakandi and Karimganj.

As per the latest data, 183 relief camps are operational providing relief to the affected people. In these relief camps a total of 83,180 flood affected people are taking shelter. In addition, 311 relief distribution centres have been set up by the district administration. As per government data, Barpeta

district has been the worst flood hit area affecting 996,190 people. There were also 937,268 people affected in Dhubri and 563,049 in Morigaon.

#### Capacity

Church's Auxiliary for Social Action (CASA) is the social action arm of the 24 Protestant and Orthodox churches in India. CASA is mandated to work for the poor and the marginalized, irrespective of any political, religion and caste consideration. CASA today is operational in 22 states, including five states in North-east India, in approximately 5,000 villages. In addition CASA supports and accompanies around 400 NGOs working on different issues throughout the country. CASA continues to respond to 60-70 small and medium disasters annually and also responds comprehensively to major emergencies with an enhanced perspective in its strategies of integrating a long-term understanding of the causes and consequences.

CASA's strengths and added capacity emerge from its direct relationship with the vulnerable communities especially the dalits, tribals, women and others, the village/cluster level Disaster Mitigation Task forces built up over a period of time in vulnerable regions of the country and also with its accompaniment of a large number of NGOs and their forums and networks operational throughout the country. The Northeast India Programme of CASA has an Office in Guwahati and they will be implementing the programme. The coordination office for the NEI programme in Guwahati has 6 staff. Further the NEI programme also has local partners associated in their regular programme.

### **Proposed response**

CASA Staff will work within the government mechanism to provide the 3000 dry food packs and shelter items to the affected individuals. The target areas are 14 villages in Barpeta District of Assam:

- 1. Mandia Development Blocks 3 villages
- 2. Rupshi Development Blocks 4 villages
- 3. Gumafulbari Development Blocks 7 villages

### Monitoring and evaluation

The Chief Zonal Officer, Additional Emergency Officer, and Senior Coordinator with the consultation of the Director will regularly monitor the implementation process of the relief programmes. The State Coordinator Assam, and Programme Associates of CASA NEI will be closely involved in implementation and monitoring the program in regular consultation with the Sr. Coordinator. The Sr. Coordinator and State Coordinator, CASA NEI will have regular visit to the relief distribution site and participate in the relief distribution programme and will also be engaged in orienting the team on beneficiary identification and implementation. The local partner NGO and local government officials will also take part in the distribution programme and the local communities will be involved to ensure quality food materials are distributed to the flood affected beneficiaries. The field level staff will involve in assessment and for distribution. The procurement committee will procure the food materials following due process. The final report will be prepared and shared as per the requirement of ACT Alliance Secretariat.

#### Section 3: ACT Alliance coordination

#### Coordination

CASA will be coordinating with the local and state government and other coordinating groups that they are already involved primarily the Inter-Agency Group (IAG) Assam at the State level and Sphere India, a coalition of Humanitarian agencies, at the national level. CASA contributes to Sphere India's humanitarian needs assessments.

#### Implementation arrangements

CASA will place 4 Field Staff and 10 Volunteers for this response. The staff will be deployed from the CASA's NEI programme based in Guwahati. Our field team will engage with the affected communities to find out who will need the assistance the most. The final list of village names and beneficiaries needing assistance are sent to the Zonal Office and Head Office. A Complaints Handling Mechanism will be setup during this response.

Human resources and administration of funds



CASA's finance policy also governs procurement norms under which three quotations are called for from local suppliers and these quotations are then analyzed by the procurement committee at the project office. After taking into consideration several factors, one or more suppliers are selected to supply the materials based on the demand.

The overall financial management and control will be with the CASA Headquarters. At the field level it will rest with CASA North East India team based in Guwahati. At the implementing level the field Officers will be responsible for financial monitoring and control. The accounts will be maintained by qualified accountants and programme accounts will be consolidated at CASA NEI Office and forwarded to CASA Delhi Head Quarters. Preparation of financial reports and the final audit will be done at CASA NEI office and sent to CASA headquarters in Delhi. The CASA Delhi headquarters will coordinate the overall operation which includes expertise in disaster response, logistics and emergency communications.

#### Communications

CASA will share all information related to the Assam flood response with the resource agencies and the other ACT forum members on a regular basis. An operational strategy will be elaborated to summarize the main landmarks of the communications support and highlight the success stories.
